Vision & Hopes from the Ven. Dr. Victor-David Mbuyi Bipungu, Coadjutor Bishop Elect

VICTOR-DAVID MBUYI BIPUNGU

The Ven Mbuyi Bipungu, Coadjutor Bishop Elect for the Diocese of Montreal, currently serves as the Priest-in-Charge of the Église de la Nativité, Rosemère and the Parish of St. Simeon & St. Bartholomew, Laval.

On Saturday, May 3, 2025, with joy and humility, I have said yes to the call to serve you as your Coadjutor bishop. It's a wonderful honour. I am grateful and I thank you for trusting me and particularly for believing the Holy Spirit who has led you in making this decision.

I have been asked to express the vision and hopes I have as the future bishop of our diocese. It's a tough task at a time when I'm still trying to come to my senses after experiencing the emotions that have overwhelmed me and all the delegates attending the Electoral Synod.

So, I will not share a plan to be carried out during my episcopacy, but, rather, my vision and hopes; for the strategic plan as I have expressed in written answers to the search committee's questions, should be drawn up collectively, i.e. with everybody's input. That's a promise to you.

This vision and these hopes are a way for me to humbly embody the Bishop's role. As officially taught and celebrated in the liturgy of bishop's ordi-

nation, the role of a bishop is clear. He or she has to "guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the church; to celebrate and to provide for the administration of the sacraments of the New Covenant; ordain priests and deacons and to join in ordaining bishops; and to be in all things the faithful, pastor, and wholesome example for the entire flock of Christ..."

All this combined with the challenges imposed by the changes taking place in our world makes the bishop's role a heavy responsibility and leads me to make St Augustine's words my own:

"Where I'm terrified by what I am for you, I am given comfort by what I am with you. For you I am a bishop, with you, after all, I am a Christian. The first is the name of an office undertaken, the second a name of grace; that one means danger, this one salvation" (Sermon 340,1).

I can add on a hopeful note that what I am *with* you, - Christian and Disciple - gives sense to what I am *for* you - Coadjutor Bishop Elect. I therefore promise to keep both aspects connected so that the Church's mission may not be just mine, but ours.

Being co-responsible for the Church's mission means being proud of our diversity and welcoming everyone without discrimination or prejudice. For that, my hope is that we continue using all our languages; particularly English and French

but additionally singing sometimes in Haitian Creole and Spanish, Swahili and Lingala or in another language, and proclaiming the gospel from the Indigenous version of the Bible. Co-responsibility in the

Co-responsibility in the Church's mission requires us to care for one another. Each and every one of us should feel safe and protected not only by caring brothers and sisters, but also by more effective policies. The diocese is already working on a robust review of its safe church policies and practices and I am committed to seeing this through with you. (see page 3)

Taking care of each other in missionary co-responsibility should also extend to our financial management. We have a duty to help parishes meet their minimum operating requirements. This will be possible if we encourage them to make better use of the resources already available, and to capitalize on neglected potential, such as our spaces, which are often leased at lower rates.

We will do all this supported by God's love, which is the engine of everything as stated in the diocesan profile under the title 'Who we are': "Our goal is to embody the love and compassion of God in all we do... we seek to be more than a gathering of individuals but a vibrant community that acts as "the hands and feet of Jesus." Our mission is to be actively engaged in the world around us, responding to the needs of our neighbors and inviting people to experience the transformative power of Christ's love...

Thank you all for being open to what the Holy Spirit is saying to us. We really felt His presence on Saturday, May 3rd. I ask for Him to continue guiding us as we have a mandate given to us by Our Lord to spread the good news of salvation and serve and grow the faith in the diocese of Montreal for the coming decade.

Don't be afraid, for the God who has made everything beatiful in its time (Eccesiastes 3:11) will be with us and we will do it well together.

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Bishop's Message, June 2025

Message de L'Évêque, juin 2025

The Diocese of Montreal has elected a new bishop, and the bishops of the Anglican Province of Canada have concurred! I am very pleased at the election of the Venerable Victor David Mbuyi Bipungu, and I am grateful to all of the candidates who put in time, thought and prayer to present their visions for the future. Thank you also to Archbishop David Edwards who led the process.

We asked the Holy Spirit to come and guide our diocese in that election. It was not an easy process and there were many bumps in the road, and many unmet expectations about how things would work. There was lots of fear about unwelcome outcomes, and lots of opinions about the danger of not electing the right candidate.

Throughout the process, many of you heard me say over and over that the Holy Spirit knew how to guide our diocese into electing the right person. My own journey of faith over the decades has been deeply enriched as I have grown in my own trust and hope in the Holy Spirit since I first became aware of the Spirit when I was a teenager. I have experienced the Spirit in many different ways, sometimes simply as an act of faith or trust and hope that God is with us.

The Church needs the Holy Spirit to lead us and guide us, to teach us and remind us of the words of Jesus. Why? Because the church

is full of human beings, each with their own personalities and foibles. It can get messy. It can be hurtful. And sometimes it can get off track completely and follow the wrong path.

Can the Holy Spirit work with people like us? I am convinced that the Holy Spirit DOES work with people like us. Read the New Testament to see what the early church experienced as it fumbled along by faith. Each of us needs to be open to God's Spirit moving in us and directing us.

In this season of Pentecost, I ask you to pray for our Diocese, for the Holy Spirit to be released on us all for the work of ministry. Pray for bishop-elect Victor David and his family. Pray for the Diocesan Council as they meet to strengthen the church and improve its policies and canons. Lean into the words Jesus said to his disciples.

"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid." John 14:25-27

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Montreal Diocesan Theological College Convocation, May 5, 2025 Fiona Crossling presented with honorary doctorate

Montreal Dio's 2025 Convocation was held on the evening of Monday, May 5, 2025 at St. George's Place du Canada.

The service was a celebration of the accomplishments of students who will go into ministry in the Anglican and United Churches as well as other Christian denominations.

Master of Divinity graduates included Ozioma Obijiofor, Sarah Wicks-Potter and Felississima Mwambarangwe.

Fiona Crossling, a member of the Church of St. Mark and St. Peter in St. Laurent and a long-time advocate for the unhoused in Montreal, gave the Convocation address.

At the ceremony, Fiona

was presented with an honorary doctorate for: "faithful and devoted lay ministry in the world that responds to a pressing human need in our context. This is an example of what baptismal ministry looks like and what it means to be a Christian in the public square."

The following is an excerpt from Ms Crossling's biography, written by her husband, the Rev Chris Barrigar.

Fiona Crossling did her BComm at McGill, and a few years later her MBA at HEC. Fiona's early career was as a management consultant within the Bell system of companies.

During her MBA studies a friend invited her to St Stephen's Westmount, where she encountered the Gospel in a new way and eventually gave her life to Christ. In 1995 Fiona married Chris Barrigar, and in 1998 they moved to Bangalore, India, where Fiona moved into non-profit management for a Christian development NGO.

During her years in Bangalore Fiona also provided management consulting for other Christian organizations in India. In 2001 Fiona and Chris moved to the city of Chennai, India, where Fiona shifted back into the business sector, taking a position as Chief Operating Officer of a Swedishowned software company.

In 2004 Fiona and Chris returned to Montreal, where Fiona took a position as Assistant Director of MultiCaf, a food-security non-profit in Cote-des-Neiges. After some time there, she moved to Assistant Director, and then Executive Director, of Share the Warmth, a community development organization in Pointe

St-Charles.

Then at the very start of the Covid lock-downs, Fiona began her current position as Executive Director of Accueil Bonneau, which was founded by the Grey Nuns nearly 150 years ago to serve the homeless of Montreal.

Fiona is a frequent voice in the Montreal media, both French and English, on behalf of the homeless of our city, and frequently engages with the Mayor's office and the provincial Minister on homelessness issues.

Fiona also believes in the value of research-supported practice, thus she has engaged her organizations with research teams from several of Montreal universities in social-sector research projects. As well, Fiona has been Chair of the Board of Interserve Canada, a human services organization that

seconds Christian professionals to organizations (both Christian and secular) in the majority world. (This was the organization which seconded Fiona and Chris to their organizations in India). She has recently contributed a chapter, on leading change, to a book on non-profit leadership.

During their years since returning to Montreal, Fiona has also been a mother of two, and active in her home churches of St Peter's TMR, and, more recently, St Mark & St Peter, St Laurent. This involvement has included teaching Sunday School, being involved in various parish groups, and on occasion helping organize certain parish events—not to mention giving moral and prayer support to her husband in his ministry.

Safe Church/Canon 1 Being Revised

The Diocese of Montreal has elected the Ven. Dr. Victor-David Mbuyi Bipungu as Coadjutor Bishop to succeed Bishop Mary Irwin-Gibson as the 13th Bishop of Montreal when she retires in October of this year.

During the lead up to our recent electoral synod, concerns were raised about the diocese's safe church policy and processes. Bishop Mary has heard these concerns and will recommend to the next meeting of Diocesan Council in June that an "ombudsperson" who is at arm's length be appointed for at least the next three months to receive any concerns, questions or complaints.

Diocesan Council has already set in motion a review of the existing Safe Church policy and we are committed to seeing this review through. Through our baptism as Christians, we have willingly and knowingly entered into a "Covenant Relationship" and are committed to making the diocese of Montreal safe(r).

This was the first time that the diocese used Canon 1 (The Election of Bishops) since its revision following the last episcopal election. Diocesan Council has indicated that it will review the electoral process to better understand how the process under the revisions of Canon 1 was exercised, the challenges the Search Committee faced, identify gaps in both process and policy, areas of concern, what needs the Search committee encountered, and propose the necessary changes.

By working together we can continue to grow and build a church that is safe and gives glory to God.

To bring this new edition to life, we sought the voices and creativity of young people across the Diocese. Through collaborative workshops and open invitations, children and youth offered their insights, questions and artistic expressions. Their contributions

Education for Ministry is a place where all questions about our faith are welcome;

Testament, Christian history, spirituality, and ethics within one year.

Who participates?

EfM is designed for lay people of all ages. At baptism we are all called to ministry. Don't let the four years be overwhelming, we only ask for a one year commitment. Or you can try the Wide Angle option of one year.

Where?

The Wednesday evening group meets in Montreal at Dio (Montreal Diocesan Theological College) on the McGill campus and online.

Phoenix Community Projects Empowering Change Igniting Hope

The Rev Jessica Bickford is the Executive Director of Phoenix Community Projects.

The church is in a time of transition as we try to understand what its role is in this current societal context. There is a great deal of talk about what the church should or could do - but what would happen if talk turned into action?

Phoenix Community Projects where passion meets purpose and neighbors become changemakers

Phoenix is not your average community initiative; it's a vibrant hub of creativity, compassion and action. Whether serving meals, hosting art workshops, or launching youth programs, Phoenix's purpose is to provide safe, inclusive and engaging environments for families, children and seniors.

Phoenix is based out of St. Margaret's of Antioch in Brossard. Created as part of cofounder Rev. Jessica Bickford's diaconal project, Phoenix began with the vision of creating intergenerational programs and spaces where people can create connections and break social isolation.

Five years later, Phoenix has become a volunteer-based not-for-profit whose mission supports: two weekly community lunches, several children's programs (Kids' Club, Play Like a Girl and Summer Day Camp), Silver Fox Club for seniors and quarterly special events (Streetfest, Halloween Trick or Treat Trail, Easter Scavenger hunt).



If this wasn't enough, the volunteers also support and create community partnerships. Phoenix has worked with schools, cegeps and other organizations to provide programs, life skills workshops, internships and work placement opportunities.

Finally, Phoenix is not just about service and outreach, as one new initiative is organizing spiritual workshops. It is Phoenix's intention to not only support physical and emotional needs but to provide opportunities to be spiritually nourished.

From a dream to reality Phoenix is an example of what can happen when a group of people have vision, desire - and are willing to do the hard work.

To continue living the dream Phoenix Community

Projects is proud to participate in the national *Say Yes to Kids* fundraising campaign hosted by the Anglican Foundation. With a goal of raising \$5,000, all proceeds will support their key children's programs; helping families access enriching, supportive activities.

Summer Organ Recitals Grace Church, Sutton

For the fourth year Grace Anglican Church Sutton will present a series of organ recitals by students at the McGill Schulich Organ School who will demonstrate their skills on the Johannus Ecclesia digital organ. This is an opportunity to hear performances from outstanding young professional organists.

June 7th

The first recital on June 7th will be given by Owen Spicer who is pursuing a Master's degree while serving as the Assistant Organist at Christ Church Cathedral in Ottawa. He also accompanies ensembles in Ottawa and Montreal, such as the Caelis Ensemble and the Christ Church Cathedral choir.

July 19th

Grace Church welcomes back Doctoral student Maria Gajraj on July19th. Her research focus is on 20th century Caribbean organ repertoire.

She is currently the Music Director of St. Lawrence Anglican Church in Montreal. Maria is passionate about studying and programming works by historically underrepresented composers, such as composers of colour and women composers. She strives to break stereotypes, and to make the organ more accessible for everyone.

September 13th

The last recital on September 13 will be given by Doctoral student Qing Xu who completed her bachelor's and master's degrees at the China Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing.

Ms Xu has performed the Chinese premiere of numerous works and has given recitals in several cities in China. As a specialist in late Romantic rep-



ertoire, several of her articles on this topic have been published in Chinese academic journals.

The organ

Grace Church's 1937 organ was typical in having a very limited specification and was designed only to accompany services. It had insufficient volume to fill the church, high maintenance costs and had to be heated in the winter.

In 2021 this organ was replaced by a Johannus Ecclesia digital organ that is maintenance free and guaranteed for 20 years with no winter heat needed. With two manuals and 26 stops, it offers versatility for all abilities of players, so any organist can select appropriate settings, whether it be for accompanying hymns or a fullscale recital.

Grace Church's Ecclesia has proved to be powerful enough to fill every nook and cranny with rousing music and its congregations are singing more lustily than ever before!

Christ Church Rawdon is making a Joyful Noise!

RODNEY CLARK

The Rev Rodney Clark is parttime Priest-in-Charge of Christ Church, Rawdon; Grace Church, Mascouche; and St-John-the-Baptist-in-the-Wilderness, Kilkenny.

Funded almost 100% from donations from outside of the parish's regular donor base, Christ Church has kicked-off the project to install a custombuilt state-of-the-art 22-stop French Baroque pipe organ.

We will remove the old organ in mid-June. This will allow for the repair of plaster and the upgrading of wiring in both organ lofts [one loft is above the sacristy – on the epistle side of the sanctuary; and another loft is above the choir room – on the gospel side of the sanctuary].

The mother boards, each weighing about 550 lbs, will be installed in mid-August, and Yves Levesque, master organ builder, will install all 1276 pipes; will rebuild the console, will wire it with state-of-the art mother boards; and have all completed for inaugural concerts Sept 26-27-28. Once completed, the value of the organ shall be greater than 700k. This will bring to more than \$1M the value of musical infrastructure for Christ Church accomplished since 2023; all to serve the cultural needs of the community and region.

We will publish information on inaugural concerts on e-news for the diocese of Montréal.



The organ motherboards will be installed in mid-August.
